Year 6 have created amazing poems based on their learning in English and Humanities about war and the impact it has on our lives and that of our forefathers.



We started off looking at large piece puzzles of things like pirates and houses:




Then we looked at Tangrams and the different shapes we could make out

### **Weekly E-Safety Tip**

This week, we are focusing on the downloadable apps that children may use. The issue is not with app design itself, but with how people use it. People (especially children) are extremely inquisitive and will find a way to deconstruct and rebuild or subvert obstacles in their way, which is fantastic for our future programmers. However, this means that a previously innocent function of an app may be re-purposed by those wanting to do harm. An example of this was the recent Snapchat update that creates a physical map showing where all of your "friends" are. This feature can be disabled Other apps may not appear to be what they are. Apps such as Bigo and Monkey have very child friendly logos but their basis is to connect the user to a random stranger to video chat with. Obviously far from ideal for a child especially if unsupervised. Nobody can 100% guarantee online safety but the best tool is knowledge. Try every app your child uses or wants to use and think about the functions it contains Vs suitability, and install parental controls on your systems.

On another note, we have been made aware from Key Stage 3 Schools of a particularly nasty video being circulated via electronic devices and/or being shared or viewed, from peer to peer. Due to the digital nature of this material, it can be shared across multiple platforms extremely quickly, therefore we are unable to specify which platform it may be on. The current advice coming from the Metropolitan Police is to check your child's devices as soon as possible, be vigilant, and to contact the DSL and/or local authorities if inappropriate material is discovered -we thought this might be particularly relevant for Parents of pupils in Year 5 and 6.
