each week, and I thank all parents for their support, encouragement and positivity with all that we do.



- Develop the creative, technical and practical expertise needed to perform everyday tasks confidently and to participate successfully in an increasingly technological world,
- Build and apply a repertoire of knowledge, understanding and skills in order to design and make high-quality prototypes and products for a wide range of users,
- Critique, evaluate and test their ideas and products and the work of others,
- Understand and apply the principles of nutrition

and learn how to cook.



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pupils will learn a range of skills and enable them to draw on their maths, science, engineering, computing and art skills, as well as helping pupils to become resourceful, innovative and enterprising. So watch this space for more exciting news.



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Curriculum Overviews

We wanted to draw you attention to our curriculum overviews which outline the content and key learning taught across each term in every year group. Our Curriculum overviews ensure that learn-



ing is sequenced, building ever upwards through the weeks, terms, years and key stages in terms of skills, knowledge and vocabulary. The curriculum webs for each year group, can be found in the parents area of the website, via this link:

Year 1

This term, Year 1 has been learning about the seasons and seasonal changes. We are recording



the weather for the week. This involves measuring the rain fall and looking to see which way the wind is blowing. To help us to do this we have made a rain gauge and a weather vane.

ECHO

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This term, we have been focusing on the Character Values: Teamwork, Creativity and Adaptability. In our opening week, the children were asked to construct the tallest, free standing tower that could withstand wind. The tallest structure belonged to Giles and William (Year 6), standing at an impressive 90cm. All the other teams successfully completed the brief and were proud of their achievements.

Table Tennis.

This term, the pupils in ECHO have focused on our forehand and backhand delivery across the table, trying to hit target areas. We have also been introducing battleship type games and competitions, whilst learning to keep a rally going with our opponents and finishing with a competitive match. The children are learning the rules of table tennis and how to umpire and score matches.



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Parents' survey feedback and actions

Thank you to everyone who returned the annual parent questionnaire.

We are delighted by the responses and comments we received. You will hopefully see how these have been used in focusing our future developments for the year ahead. It is good to see that the hard work that goes on at school has been recognised. We very much rely on this process as a way of evaluating the performance of our school for the past year and have identified strengths along with aspects that we will continue to work together on develop.

We feel that it is important that the responses are fed back to you as parents, to keep you informed. The questionnaire is a real way for parents to be heard. Your comments are very helpful in focusing our future school developments to make further improvements.



95% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed the School's curriculum is broad and balanced,

92% agreed or strongly agreed the School has a positive, respectful culture in which the children are well cared for,

93% agreed or strongly agreed that the teaching at the school is good,

98% agreed or strongly agreed that staff are welcoming and approachable,

91% agreed or strongly agreed that the School meets the particular needs of my child,


89% agreed or strongly agreed the School values the views, wishes and feelings of parents,

90% agreed or strongly agreed that the School ensures that my child is well prepared for the future.

We also appreciate that there are always things that could be even better, and we are aware of these. From the survey, this year, we will be looking at

- Communication from the School to parents: we recognise that this needs to be streamlined to avoid many different channels being used, which can be confusing. We are currently looking into ways to ensure timeliness and clarity for parents.
- 11+ prep for exams: in school, the Year 5 and 6 teams have already met to map out what our plan is to ensure that everything that needs to

be covered in terms of curriculum content and exam preparation is in hand. Miss Rule will be speaking to Year 5 at the 11+ meeting later this term about how we are delivering the integral preparation to ensure pupils are more than ready for the 11+ exams in December.



we are very keen to develop and extend this, and as such, we will be producing a programme of Parent Education each term where parents will be invited to experience sessions on what, how and why we teach various subjects, as well as guidance and parental support with pastoral matters.

In terms of smaller things to work on:

- Holiday clubs we appreciate that there is a need for provision from a provider to run clubs during the holiday period, and we hope to be able to provide something by the Easter holidays. Watch this space.
