Dear Parents,

We enjoyed a full week in school this week (!) and, with no residential trips happening, we had all year groups in school! It was lovely to see our Year 4s and 6s back from their travels, you can read more about Year 4s time away,

in this week's newsletter, and Year 6s will feature next week.

As I mentioned last week, we will be hosting an English Curriculum Evening after half-term, on Wednesday 7th June, which we hope many parents will attend. Mr Pretara and Miss Johns have sent out an email which includes a Google Form to register your attendance.

Ahead of this, I wanted to address how we have done much to raise the profile of the English curriculum, and more specifically reading, this year. You know it is my favourite topic to talk about, but reading is such a crucial element of every child's education, and it is an essential skill as they transition through life. The better a child can read, the easier it will be for them to learn what they need at school.

Every day, we have a dedicated reading time, straight after lunch, when the children enjoy the book they are reading and read to an adult. The expectation is that every child gets heard at least once per week by an adult. and this is then recorded in the pupil's School Planner. To that end, although the life of a parent is often hectic, our expectation is that you will also be reading with your child at least once a day at a regularly scheduled time. I know I will be preaching to the choir to the majority of our parents, but you have a crucial role to play in a child's engagement and achievement in school, and the impact of a child's success is never greater than when we are working in partnership. Parents often will read aloud with younger children, but this becomes less so as children get older. Parents will often ask, "Why would I need to carry on reading to/with my child as they can read independently"; however, I want to let you know that reading aloud to already-fluent readers can still be hugely valuable, not least for my reasons below:

• You can share books that might be too sophisticated or challenging to read independently. These books that are too long for their current level of reading stamina, or books with tricky vocabulary

or that introduce tricky concepts that need explaining benefit from discussion with an adult and allows you to stretch the reading-diet and understanding.

- Sharing a book, and listening to you read helps to model fluent, expressive reading for a child. It allows children to hear how a skilled reader brings the words on the page to life, using their voice to suggest meaning within a text.
- One of the most important things to do with competent readers is to spend time discussing ideas and share opinions about what you're reading as opposed to doing the physical reading on the page. This is great educationally, as it helps children to think deeply about a text and practise justifying their opinions, but it can also help to build the habit of reading and talking together: a wonderful end in itself.
- And probably, most importantly, it safeguards some shared time together between parent (both mum and dad) and child – time to enjoy a book that you both want to read, a book you now share in common.

Hand on heart, I can say that there is absolutely no replacement for time spent sharing a book with your son or daughter – end of story. This is the single most impactful thing you can do to help them educationally. The children who find greater success in school are those voracious readers. To this end, a small plea...when you do share or read together, please note this in your child's Planner as we would do at school. This way, we can work together and track how this is being facilitated to continue your child's learning journey.

Finally, this week, we began to turn our attention to our upcoming 130th birthday, and had a lovely picture taken with pupils creating the shape of the number "130". There will be a little bit of media coming your way to show you the process and the final outcome, so look out for that. Huge thanks to Mrs Taggart (Ollie and Ella) and her sister for helping us with the logistics and the technology!

Have a lovely weekend. Do remember that next week is our final week before half term. This is a four day week, with our staff training on the Friday, when pupils will not be in school.

After lunch, we ventured onto Grosvenor Hall and, after depositing our luggage, we were off to participate in our first activity. Unfortunately, the weather was not on our side, but after a quick lightning storm, we were back outside taking part in obstacle courses and tug of war. Even the teachers were roped in - no pun intended!

Much to the teachers' delight, everyone slept really well and so we were up early taking part the next day in activities such as team building, archery, fire lighting and the famous 3G Swing. The evening activity consisted of water balloons and needless to say some people ended up wet - but not as much as our leader Callum who actively encouraged us to throw water at him. Unsurprisingly, the second night involved a quicker bed time and most of the children having to be woken up in the morning as no one was as keen to get up due to being so tired from all the fresh air! Design Technology

This term, we have launched a brand new and exciting subject into our curriculum...Design & Technology! DT is a practical subject that is fo-

cussed on problem solving and developing creative and critical thinking. It also feeds into our big drive in STEM.

Every DT topic will involve research and evaluating existing products, as well as designing, planning, making and evaluating a new product,

based upon a given Design Brief. It will be a creative, engaging and crosscurricular journev for the children. which will develop and enhance their ability to use many of our Character Values, including: Creativity, Teamwork, Enthusiasm, Common Sense and Adaptability. DT will provide our children with the

fundamental

skills that are

vital in later life, especially the Resilience and Ambition to try again, if at first they don't succeed!

Each term, we will be introducing a new and exciting aspect of DT across the whole school, as part of our ever-growing curriculum, including Food

Technology, Textiles and Mechanical Systems.

This term, our focus has been Food Technology. We have discussed the importance of healthy eating and maintaining a balanced diet; hygiene and risks when preparing food and skills that we will be using throughout.

Each Year group has been given a Design Brief, conducted market research on items already

available (including taste-testing) and are now in the process of designing their own product, using Computer Aided Design (CAD). We have had excellent feedback on our DT journey so far from both staff and pupils and we look forward to seeing

more of this enthusiasm as our DT skills evolve.

We know that exposing our children to DT will allow them to experience and understand the world in a more meaningful way. This subject will in-

crease our pupils' opportunities and open them up to a breadth of knowledge from a STEM perspective - showing them that the possibilities for

their futures are endless; we may have many Engineers, Designers, Architects, Chefs and Food Scientists in the making!

Make sure you ask your son/daughter what they have been investigating in DT this term so far (and read the Year 1 article too!)



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Charity work: Re-engage tea party

Last Friday, we invited the Charity, Re-engage. into school and met some guests who came to join us. They were treated to fantastic cakes and music, poetry and song, and various children from Year 5 came to chat with our guests and compared and contrasted their lives at school.

One of our guests, Audrey, who was 92, told us about her time at school and how boys got to play sports whilst she did needlework classes. Audrey

was at school during the war so often, due to rationing. the children did not have lunch. Another guest, Pamela. left school at 15 and worked in an office. Her school lunchtime was 30 mins and she had to

walk over 2 miles to the office and 2 miles home each day. The children were very

surprised that our quest did not have books to read at home, and that they didn't learn a foreign languages.

Moving forward, we will be working with Reengage each term to give back to our sometimes lost generation and ensure our children look at the past as well as their future
