

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English Curriculum Evening

Last week, we launched our first ever Parent Education evening for English.

These are important events as they allow us to not only explain how our English curriculum is delivered to the children and how parents can support their children at home, but an opportunity for parents to see this first-hand.

The evening was a big success. The parents enjoyed being part of one of three lessons depend-

ing on the age of their child. This gave the them the chance to get a feel of what and how their children are being taught.

Spanish ECHO (Prep)

This term, a group of keen linguists from Years 5 and 6 have been improving their Spanish memory and pronunciation skills in our Primary Bee ECHO Club in preparation for the national final, which will take place at the University of Cambridge on Tuesday, 27th June. The children have participated in fun, whole-class vocabulary games to help consolidate the key words and worked independently on iPads, using the learning platform Vocab Express. They have especially enjoyed competing with one another and monitoring their progress on the online leaderboards. During the week after half-term, they all took part in an in-school competition to help determine the four finalists. Each child had to translate as many words as they could from English into Spanish in one minute. We are delighted that Matteus and Daniel from Year 5 and Giles and Shemaya from Year 6 have been selected as our four finalists. <u>Photography ECHO (Pre-Prep)</u>



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E-safety Tip

This week, we are focussed on how we respond to a child who has seen something upsetting, and on prevention. Here are five 'top tips' condensed from the document "Supporting Children to Deal With Upsetting Content" published by National Online Safety.

Find out what the child already knows.

Online or offline, content that is upsetting can be found easily. It is a good idea to listen rather than inform when trying to find out how they have been impacted by what they have seen. Avoid leading questions and complicated details.

Find the right time and place

This could be an emotional conversation, so make sure you have time. Just before bed or going to school is not ideal. Try to find a time when they are relaxed and open to talking and can take things at their own speed. Young children may not openly say they are scared, angry or sad. Keep an eye on body language.

Set limits.

Managing screen time and content is difficult, but can be made easier with parental control settings.

Many internet providers, web browsers, devices and anti-virus software have these built in. Explore the options and discuss what the restrictions are for, and how they will keep them safe.

Encourage questions.

Children are still learning that not everything online is accurate - you want to be their ultimate source of information, not their device. Encourage the child to talk about what they have seen, how they came to see it. Our emotions as adults in this situation will determine how they will feel about opening up to a conversation. Keep calm! Children will emulate your response and build resilience and coping strategies.

Identify help.

It is massively important that children know where to find help. In school, our safeguarding team is clearly visible and talked about with the children. Encourage children to know who their trusted adults are, and that they are not alone in dealing with something that has made them feel uneasy.

We are delighted to welcome Reuel and Maya (Reception) to our school. They joined last week, and they both settled so quickly, and have already proved to be a real asset to our school community.

Please remember, we are a nut free school. Additionally, do ensure your children are dressed


comfortably if they have sports
