

<u>STEM</u>

This week saw Mr Chowdhury and Mrs Morris lead an assembly on STEM in order to enthuse and promote the variety of STEM opportunities at St Christopher's.



STEM stands for Science, Engineering, Technology and Mathematics. It represents the group of subjects that fall within these four areas of study. STEM education focuses on practical learning, to develop the necessary skills in students so our pupils are prepared for the rapidly-developing real world. The children were told about what STEM comprises of with a little demonstration of a Science activity which involved an upside down cup of water over Mr Chowdhury, Mrs Morris attempting to play Tetris to illustrate the Engineering element of design, a guest appearance of the marvellous mind reader (also known as Mr Chowdhury) to explain a mathematical trick and an animated powerpoint to show how easy it is to make visual effects using the technology we have around us.

We are expanding our STEM provision with new STEM ECHO clubs coming throughout the next academic year, a variety of STEM based afterschool clubs as well as our upcoming STEM afternoon in school on Thursday 6th July. We know the children will enjoy the activities their teachers have planned for that afternoon as we have had a sneak preview of their ideas! We are already drawing up plans for a very exciting STEM week next year after the huge success of Science Week in March. As always, we would very much welcome any parents (or contacts!) to come into school and inspire and motivate our pupils further in the world of STEM.

a refreshing ice lolly. It was a successful and exciting day at the 'St Christopher's Car Wash'. Well done, Year 5.



Poetry by Heart at the Globe

On Monday, the Poetry Performance ECHO clubbers went on an exciting trip up to London by train to visit The Globe Theatre where the grande finale of the Poetry By Heart National Competition was held.

We were treated to a day of inspired poetry recitations by young people representing all Key Stages from ages 7-18, as well as some teachers and famous poets such as Daljit Nagra, Valerie Bloom and Matt Goodfellow reciting their own poems for us.

Although we weren't chosen to perform in the Grand Finale, we

were awarded a Highly Commended for our choral poem which, for the first time entering a National competition and a mix of Year 3 to Year 6 children, is a fantastic result!

The judges said of our entry, 'a very good performance- you dramatise the key ideas with energy and good humour. Congratulations on your



magnificent entry into the 2023 national Poetry by Heart competition. Thank you for all the effort you made to learn your poem and for

sharing your unique presentation. You can be very proud of your achievement.'

Congratulations to Shemaya, Charlie Cian (Year 6), Maya and Nico (Year 5), Ruby (Year 4), and Joanna (Year 3). An additional congratulations must go to both Joanna and Ruby who also entered the competition as soloists, having to learn two solo poems, one pre-1914 and one post 1914 they both achieved magnificent results for these recitations.

<u>Spanish Primary Bee</u>

On Tuesday 27th June, four of our finest linguists from Years 5 and 6 took part in the Spanish Primary Bee National final at the University of Cambridge to compete against the most proficient language learners in the country. This fantastic initiative aims to support and inspire children to practise and improve their vocabulary, pronunciation and memory skills in Spanish.

We set off early by train and the children excitedly spent the journey testing one another on all the competition's key words. On arri-



val, we took a picturesque walk in the sunshine through the beautiful Cambridge streets and stopped for a delicious ice cream along the River Cam. Later, we headed to Lady Mitchell Hall at the Faculty of Medieval Languages and Linguistics in order to soak up the pre-competition atmosphere and have a quick bite of lunch with a game of chess.


The competition began at 1pm and the children were excited to hear that they were sitting in the very hall where Stephen Hawking celebrated his 75th birthday. Each school's contestants had to stand and translate as many words as possible from English into Spanish in one minute with the added challenge of performing in front of a large audience. Two judges, one of whom was a native speaker, listened and kept score. One point was awarded for every word that was correctly translated and pronounced. Despite the fluttering of nerves (mainly from the teachers!), all four children calmly and confidently translated their key words at lightning speed with no mistakes.

There was a healthy dose of competitive spirit between all the competing schools but also a real sense of enjoyment. Our children really stepped up to the challenge and were wonderful



ambassadors for St. Christopher's. Despite narrowly missing out on a place in the final, the children were already winners to us and made us so proud. iBuen trabajo, todo el mundo!
