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A Celebration of Pupil Progress - Academic Year 2022/2023

This year, our academic focus has been to analyse pupil progress throughout the year. We have done this by looking at value-added progress across the school, which is a fair measure of the progress that pupils have made. Looking at value-added progress plays an important role in providing evidence for selfevaluation and school improvement. We then aim to drive improvements by identifying performance above or below expectation across the main curriculum areas.

Rather than relying solely on assessment results, we take into account each students' starting point and the progress they have made. This has allowed us to

ask the right questions about individual subject strengths, share best practice between departments, support judgements about assessment and support, and tailor individual pupil target-setting.

By analysing both our formal assessments and class teacher assessments across the year, we are delighted to share that in Maths, 88% of our pupils are working at an expected level for their age or higher than expected. In English 85% are working at an expected level or higher than expected for their age. These are incredible results to celebrate and as well as being proud of the efforts and hard work from the children, this is also an opportunity to recognise that this can only occur due to the high level of teaching and learning that is being provided by our excellent teaching staff.

Preschool

What a fantastic and exciting year we have had in Preschool. The first term saw our fabulous new Preschool building completed with lovely bright, clean and cosy classrooms. Our Christmas concert soon followed with great success and confident performances all round. We enjoyed our Christmas party and Gordon the entertainer was, as usual, a highlight, amazing us all with his magic tricks. The Spring term brought the visit from the theatre group on the theme of Superheroes where the children thoroughly enjoyed exploring their own hero attributes. The Summer term was perfect weather for exploring growing plants and watching our caterpillars turn into butterflies. The children enjoyed taking part in our Sports morning - lots of fun and laughter ensued, especially in the parents' race! The year ended with our 130th birthday celebrations. We added our own contribution to the time capsule with the theme of 'When I grow up I would like to

be'. It has been a really enjoyable year, with the loveliest children, and we all wish them all the very best as they begin their school journeys next year.


<u>Year 1</u>

Modern Foreign Languages

What a fantastic year for languages at St.Christopher's the Hall! The launch of Spanish into our curriculum has been a huge success and all year groups have enjoyed taking part in engaging and interactive lessons with Mrs Dubeck. There has been a real emphasis on having fun in language lessons and developing an understanding of both the language and the culture of the countries where French and Spanish are spoken. We have worked hard to ensure a whole-school approach to language learning through a variety of enrichment activities.



We were proud to receive the British Council International School Award in recognition of our drive to promote internationalism and to raise the profile of languages across the school. More recently, we were thrilled that four of our children made it through three stages to achieve a place at the Spanish Primary Bee National final at the University of Cambridge.

Next year, we will continue to build upon our successes, and we are particularly looking forward to launching our first trip to Madrid and working towards British Council accreditation by forging a link with Colegio San José in Argentina.

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


SCA
