Dear Parents.

We are both delighted to be writing this newsletter. Mr Carter has been busy at the IAPS Heads' Conference

for three days this week and we look forward to hearing about that in due course.

At the end of last week we had the pleasure of attending a very inspiring conference in Heathrow. This was the ISPN (Independent Schools Partnership Network) conference which provided us with a unique opportunity to share experiences and to discover leading-edge solutions from the sector's most innovative suppliers.

The two days featured a fantastic agenda of presentations and panel discussions from senior leaders who are at the forefront of innovation, transformation and improvement in the education sector. A few key takeaways for us included how to champion equity, how our school can become more sustainable, developing resilience and wellbeing amongst pupils and staff and how to further embed digital and AI into our curriculum. We look forward to talking to staff more about some of these key issues and ways in which we can further improve our school.

On Monday afternoon, we welcomed our Reception parents for a Parent Education session on reading and phonics. This is probably the most important part of a young child's education and it is crucial that we work together to develop early reading skills and foster a love of learning from

a young age. We use the Read Write Inc. model of teaching phonics and in Pre-Prep the children are placed in phonics groups according to their phonic stage, not their age. At the same time every day, across the whole of Pre-Prep, children participate in small group phonics sessions, targeted to their specific needs. As we shared at the Parent Education session, correct pronunciation of the letter sounds is vital at this early stage and if you would like to learn more about the session, please have a look at the 'Reception Reading Meeting Powerpoint' on the school website.

We had a very successful and busy Open Morning on Tuesday with a wave of prospective parents. We both enjoyed leading this in Mr Carter's absence and talking to the parents about what they look for when choosing a school for their children. It was very promising to see such a lot of interest in our school and receive so much positive feedback from their visit. Yet again, our Year 6 pupils did a fine job showing the parents around all of the classrooms and facilities. We would like to thank our Governors and SCA for being on hand to chat and answer any questions; it really is an invaluable part of the Open Morning.

Year 6 were busy with Bikeability this week and it looked like they thoroughly enjoyed themselves. We popped out a few times to see how they were getting on and were very impressed with their listening skills, enthusiasm and general attitude towards the instructors.

there. Our curriculum supports children learning about this all year round. Further information about this with more details of the planned events and activities will be sent out by email to you today.



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
St Christopher's in the Community



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E-safety tip (CO)

This week we focus on an app, popular with the online gaming community, called Discord. The following is a link to an article from the NSPCC titled Should I let my child use Discord?



Should I let my child use Discord?

Discord is a messaging service where a user can set up a message board and invite others to contribute to it. It has an age rating of 13+ and is incredibly popular and is growing its base of users beyond the gaming community to other interests.

Users are able to post messages in the form of text, but also pictures and in addition there is a function to post voice messages. Furthermore the options to engage in live voice chat and to invite others into "private" messaging and conversations should be of concern to any parent.

A direct quote from the article:

Young people who have contacted Childline have described the platform as being a good place to meet new people outside of their normal social circle. Some also spoke about it being somewhere they can explore romantic connections and talk to others with similar interests to them.

However, they also reported experiencing abuse and harassment on the platform. Some also shared that they had been exposed to harmful and inappropriate content on the app.

The article covers safety settings and what the potential pitfalls could be for your child. It is essential reading for those with children who enjoy spending time in games with an online element.
