Dear Parents.

I have enjoyed being back in school this week, after being away in Liverpool for the IAPS Heads' Conference, last week. I am incredibly grateful to our Senior Leadership Team and, in particular, Mrs. West and Mrs.

Wanstall for steering the ship while I was away.

During the conference, there were opportunities to discuss the future of the private education sector and the challenges it may face. It's worth noting that Labour's proposed tax on independent school fees may have consequences that extend beyond its intended targets, possibly affecting hardworking parents who make significant sacrifices to send their children to private schools. In light of the current cost of living crisis, we understand that this could pose a challenge for some families. As a school, we are committed to doing our best to shield our parents from excessive financial burdens. A key insight from the conference was the importance of advocacy and engaging with our local Member of Parliament and parliamentary candidates. This engagement is crucial in addressing any potential short-term and long-term impacts resulting from proposed policies. The upcoming Labour conference, scheduled from Sunday through Wednesday next week (ironically at the same venue where we held our own conference in Liverpool last week), is expected to provide more details and draw intense media attention to these matters. We will be closely monitoring these developments and remain mindful of their potential consequences for our school community.

On a lighter note, Liverpool was a lovely place to visit, and I had the chance to appreciate the work of George Stubbs, a renowned artist. If you haven't already, I encourage you to consider a visit to the National Gallery in London, especially if you're interested in art and culture. It can be a delightful trip to take with your children, exposing them to the rich world of art.

I am delighted to inform you that our comprehensive resources for spelling, vocabulary, and grammar overviews, along with book recommendations tailored to your children's enjoyment, are now readily accessible in the Parents Area of our website under the "English Resources and Curriculum Guidance" section. These resources provide a valuable insight into what will be taught throughout the academic year. 

taking orders and encouraging everyone to use as much French target language as possible.


At lunchtime, we were all treated to a wonderful French menu from the catering team. The dining hall decorations looked super and the crêpe bar proved a huge hit. It was



fantastic to see how eager the children were to try new foods.


We rounded off the day with children enjoying a French story led by Mrs Dubeck, Mrs West and Mr Pretara.

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Black History Month

On Wednesday, we welcomed Ms Aderinola (mum to Seth (Yr 4) and Naomi (Ladybird class)), to our Whole School Assembly to help kickstart our Black History Month focus.

October is a time dedicated to honouring and celebrating the incredible contributions of Black

individuals. The theme this year is 'Celebrate/ Salute Our Sisters', shining a spotlight on the remarkable contributions of Black women throughout history who have made their mark on our world in her own special way. Be it writers, scientists, leaders or sportswomen, their stories are filled with inspiration. Their stories show determination, creativity, resilience and the sheer power of believing in oneself.

Ms Aderinola introduced us to some Black women in the field of STEM that we had never heard of such as Dr Anne-Marie Imafidon MBE who was super smart with computers, even as a child. She helped other boys and girls learn about Science and Maths with her group called STEMettes. She passed an advanced computer exam when she was only 11 years old. Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock is an space scientist and talks about space on a television programme called 'The Sky at Night'. She has built special tools to help scientists look at stars. Chi Onwurah used to build cool technology objects as an engineer and now she helps to make the rules in Parliament. She believes that both boys and girls can be



superheroes when it comes to technology.

Ms Aderinola kindly donated the school some posters which can be found displayed around the school. Look out also for our Black History Month working wall display board in the front entrance hall.

Always remember, as we delve into these stories and workshop activities over the next couple of weeks and throughout the coming academic year, they serve as a testament to the incredible potential within us all, no matter our gender or background.



St Christopher's in the Community


Our School is all about the wider community and everyone is an important part of this. Our governors are an important part of this community and their job in itself is a voluntary position, and we are grateful for all the time and energy they invest into supporting and guiding us within school.

However, on top of this, members of our Governing Board take on additional charitable volunteering, and this week we are going to feature their endeavours which will add to our targets of committing 130 hours this year.

Mrs Curtis, our Chair of Governors, has always been keen on sport, be it participating or watching. As a child, she swam for her home town swimming club and was grateful for the time and effort that the parents, including her own, put into running the club for them. As a parent, she believes it is important to support her own children and give them the opportunity to play sports with their friends and peers in a positive and encouraging environment. This year is the 9th season that she has been team administrator for her son's football team: the Glebe Tigers, where she makes sure that fees are collected, coaches and referees are paid and kits are ordered. She enjoys this volunteer work as she has watched the team grow and develop both as players and as young men. She is also the Colts Registration Secretary at a local cricket club, OD CUACO CC. Again, she finds this rewarding to support the work of the coaches and managers there, to help a small, family orientated club and to make players and their parents feel welcome. Volunteering for a local team is a great way to become part of the local community and without volunteers children's grassroots sport would simply not exist.

Mr Martin, our Chair of the IT and H&S Committee is involved in a local scout group, as Group Secretary handling the waiting list and general administration, as well as a member of the team organising the annual Beckenham Fireworks and Easter Egg Hunt. Last year over £90,000 was raised for local charities, with donations including £10,000 each for St Christopher's Hospice and the local Living Well food bank. He also can often be found leading rides with the Penge Cycle Club on Sunday mornings, introducing new riders to the lanes of Kent.



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E-Safety Tip

This week, we would like to share an excellent resource from CEOP in the form of a playable game for children and a set of three videos connected to it that



cover a range of strategies to stay safe online.

Play Like Share follows the adventures of Alfie, Ellie and Sam as they form a band and enter their school's Battle of the Bands contest, taking on the mean but 'cool' Popcorn Wizards as they go. The three friends learn that while the internet can help, they need to use it wisely and safely.

The aim of the films is to help 8-10 year olds learn how to stay safe online. In particular, the films teach them to spot the early signs of manipulative, pressurising and threatening behaviour by people they might meet online, and develop their confidence to respond safely and get help.

You can watch Play Like Share with your child and use this to start a conversation with them about the internet and being safer online. All three episodes can be found on the CEOP website for 8-10 year olds, where you will also find a fun interactive game called Band Runner that helps this age group learn how to be safer from risks they might encounter online.
