Building this emotional intelligence is an essential foundation for creating a school environment where every child feels valued and understood, contributing to a harmonious and thriving community.

We hosted our first Open Morning for the Spring Term for prospective parents, and it exceeded expectations! 

We very much extend our sincere gratitude to the parents who gave us their invaluable feedback. Your insights provide a comprehensive view of our collective journey, and we are delighted to share both the positives and areas where we aim to enhance our efforts. The percentages we refer to here are those where there is a 4 or 5 rating.

Highlights:


- School Leadership and Management:An overwhelming 93% of parents acknowledge the school's leadership and management as being a positive aspect, ensuring a positive, nurturing environment.
- Positive Attitude to School:, 97% of parents report the child has a positive attitude toward school life, a testament to our holistic and caring ethos. and especially heartening to hear.
- Independent Learning: 94% of Parents noted a significant improvement in their children becoming independent learners.
- Broad and Balanced Curriculum: 93% commend the school's curriculum for its breadth and balance, fostering a holistic educational experience.
- Exciting and Innovative Teaching: 90% of you appreciate the exciting and innovative approach to teaching, marking a significant improvement from the previous year.

Parent-Teacher Communication: While 72%
express satisfaction with communication
between home and school, we do acknowledge
the need to streamline our emails to enable a
more efficient system - we have included more

Areas for Improvement:

- Homework: Parents suggest fine-tuning the homework system for increased turnaround time and flexibility which we are looking into currently.
- Parent Workshops: Despite a positive response (71% attended), we'll consider accommodating different schedules and addressing child care concerns for wider participation.
- Communication on Holiday Clubs/Workshops: Enhancing communication about holiday clubs and workshops to facilitate better planning for parents.
- SCAMPS Provision: Responding to your input, we're committed to enhancing SCAMPS provision with a focus on healthier food options and increased structure.
- Your feedback is invaluable, and we appreciate your commitment to working together for the best interests of our students. We look forward to a continued partnership as we strive for excellence.

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Communication

We are grateful for the recent parent survey responses, and your insights have been invaluable in shaping our commitment to continuous improvement in communication. To address concerns raised regarding communication overload and to create a more organised communication flow, we have decided to do the following to hopefully help:

Streamlining Medical Tracker Emails:

We have decided to streamline the delivery of Medical Tracker emails. Starting immediately, all non-urgent medical updates will be sent out at 3 pm. However, in the case of a head injury, you will receive an immediate phone call, ensuring you're promptly informed. Parents in Preschool will receive these emails earlier in the day due to their shorter days especially as some do not stay for an afternoon session.

Consolidated Communication:

All non-urgent emails, including those from teachers and the school, will now be sent at 4.15 pm. This consolidated approach aims to provide you with a designated time for updates, reducing

the frequency of communications throughout the day. Time-sensitive matters may prompt a phone call instead. Do note: Emails from Mr. Carter or the Bursar will be sent when received, allowing for adequate response time.

Additionally, we will strive to include school-wide communications in the newsletter, minimising separate emails and ensuring essential information is accessible in one central location.

Trial Period and Feedback:

We understand the importance of effective communication, and we're eager to trial these changes to assess their impact. Before the Easter holidays, we will reach out for your feedback on these adjustments. Your thoughts will guide us in making further improvements to ensure our communication strategies align with your needs.

We appreciate your patience and understanding as we implement these changes. Our goal is to create an environment where communication is thoughtful, streamlined, and tailored to enhance your experience.




Exploring the many practical activities, the children got opportunities to create digital films, program a robot to complete a task and explore who they were in the 'Who am I?' area of the
