Behaviour and Expectations

Merits

At St Christopher's The Hall, we are excited to introduce our new merit system, which emphasises fluidity between classes and the ability to reward children anytime, anywhere. Our focus is on recognising and praising individual effort in the moment, fostering a culture of immediate positive reinforcement which matches our school ethos of personal pastoral growth.

With the implementation of ClassDojo, merits can be awarded seamlessly across the entire school. This system empowers all staff to acknowledge and reward students for their hard work and achievements, regardless of location. This means that the merits pages in planners will not be used for this academic year but rest assured that merits are still being handed out in a more efficient, fun way.





Dismissal Lists

We are always looking for ways to send fewer printouts home and so the school will now be transitioning to *using Google Forms exclusively for dismissal lists*.

You will be sent a link with some simple questions about where your child will be going at the end of each day and who will be picking them up. You will also be asked to choose a password for your child, should someone else need to collect them on the day.

With our new staff iPads, this means we can check the dismissal list on the move and will make it so any covering staff member can safely dismiss your child.

This is due back by Friday 13th at the latest.

- In Year 5, we build on the grammar, punctuation and spelling from Year 4 and encourage lengthy and detailed pieces of work.
- 5 sessions per week, in addition to:
 - Quiet reading sessions will take part during the afternoon form time where there will be opportunities to read 1:1 with an adult a couple of times each week.
 - Reading at home and recording in their planners.
 - Spelling lessons taught throughout the week to cover Year 5 spelling rules and patterns.
 - Library sessions weekly.

Children will complete a range of genres throughout the year including, fiction and non-fiction writing. We are going to be using a whole class text to deliver our English lessons,

Autumn:

Taught through a wide range of high quality Power of Reading texts that change regularly to expose children to a high level of vocabulary, text genres, themes and authors/poets. We will be incorporating comprehension, grammar and writing skills throughout.

Spring/Summer:

- 3 x focused reading sessions (Mr Carter, Mrs Dodd)
- 2 x creative writing sessions
- The children will be targeted by our approach to teaching which challenges each child according to their needs and knowledge. These will be assessed each lesson and the children will be taught accordingly, using our professional experience and decisions.



We are following the White Rose scheme. In Year Five we also use other resources to support and extend learning.

From the Spring Term onwards, we begin to introduce smaller focused groups to challenge and support children of all abilities. This term, we will take a more fluid approach, teaching as a whole class and in groups where we feel it will benefit the needs of the children. This will be with ourselves as well as Mrs Dodd and the learning enrichment team.

<u>Assessment:</u> Informal termly assessments will happen in class to inform planning and assess where the children are at and to support them further.

Assessments on the computer in Autumn and Summer.

VR and NVR

Mrs West will be teaching these skills each week in preparation for the 11+ (and general Maths reasoning skills - verbal and non-verbal reasoning).

Work will be differentiated in class to support and extend all learners throughout the year.





Across the school we are promoting STEM - Science Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, so that Science will incorporate as much Maths and Technology as we can fit in naturally eg using laptops for research and presentations, taking photos and videos of work on ipads and reading scales and graphs which fits as part of the Statistics strand that we cover in Maths.

Autumn - Materials and their Properties and Space.

Spring - Forces and Living Things.

Summer - Diversity in Science project and Animals Including Humans.



<u>Homework</u>

Children will be set homework each night. It will either be Maths or English based. On Friday they may be asked to complete a topic-based task when relevant to the learning - Please see policy for guidelines.

Reading: 20 minutes per night - This will be monitored weekly.



Monday - Thursday (30 minutes)

Homework MUST be completed every evening. Unlike Year 4, the children will usually be given homework linked to their classwork from that day. They will often bring their Maths and English books home and will be expected to return them the following day.

If it is not complete, there will be gaps in their learning as we will need to move on due to the high expectations of Year 5.

(Some evening homework may only take 15 minutes)

If you need to help your child with their homework, please write on the work (S) so that we can see that is supported work.

Termly Overview

Each term, overviews will be on the website. These will outline what the children are learning within each subject. There will be a link to these on the newsletter this week. These will be on the website in due course.



What your child needs to bring to school

- School rucksack containing school planner and reading book.
- Pencil Case with the following equipment: Pencil, rubber, ruler, glue stick, writing pen (x2), colouring pencils. In the Spring Term, the children will need a protractor.
- Healthy snack and water bottle. No nuts, chocolate, sweet or crisps please.
- PE/ Games kit on Thursday and Friday. Swimming kit on a Thursday. This will change in the Spring Term.









Top tips in Year 5

Check timetable every morning to ensure that your child has all equipment needed for that day - Planner, pencil case, book, healthy snack and water bottle. All labelled please.

- Children will require their own equipment in order to fully participate in their learning, including: Writing pen, pencil, ruler, rubber, colouring pencils, glue, whiteboard pen, etc.

Organisation and adaptability - Moving around the school and interacting with different teachers.

Keep on top of homework - it is often an extension of the classwork and they will be sent home with their exercise books - no homework books this year. It is an extremely busy year!

Regular practice of Times Tables Rockstars. It is a National Curriculum requirement that by the end of **Year 4 children should** know all the times tables from 1-12.

Read, read and read some more!

Enjoy each day - the year will pass by very quickly!

10+ and 11+

We do not prepare or encourage pupils to take the 10+.

We feel it can be detrimental to their primary school experience. They miss out on important Year 6 experiences/shows/trips.

Year 6 in secondary school is taught by secondary teachers; they may not get the nurture and support they need in comparison to Year 6 at St Christopher's.

If they take the 10+ test, and are unsuccessful, it may have a negative impact on their journey when taking 11+. If the children get in for the 10+, they will more than likely get in for the 11+.

We prepare children for the 11+ throughout the year and for the first term in Year 6 (including VR and NVR - this starts in Year 5 as well). We also provide an enriched curriculum for those who do not wish to sit these exams. We aim for accelerated learning for all pupils, whatever their next step may be.

It has got to be what is right for YOUR child. Please don't panic!
We will hold a meeting in the Summer Term with more information about the 11+ and secondary school options.
