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<u>Languages in our school curriculum so far</u> this term

French:

Since the start of the year, Year 1 & 2 students have revised topics such as greetings, colours and numbers. They have enjoyed taking their work home to show you what they have been doing in lessons.

It has been a delight to see how enthusiastically Reception pupils have been towards their language learning. They have enjoyed learning some basic vocabulary such as greetings and the names of pets.


Year 3 and 4 have been using their ipads to take notes, do research and consolidate their learning using Kahoot.

Spanish:

Year 5 has been very enthusiastic about learning Spanish for the first time. They have been busy building up their vocabulary in the following topics: greetings, dates and descriptions.

Year 6 have been developing their understanding of key grammatical concepts such as adjective agreements and using verbs in the third person.

All Prep students took part in a research lesson, finding out about the European Day of Languages in September, whilst Pre-prep pupils learnt about how animals make different sounds in different languages. Reception and Year 1 looked at Halloween vocabulary before completing a counting and colouring activity and in honour of Black History Month, pupils were introduced to some prominent French and Spanish speaking black celebrities.

Classics ECHO Club

During the Classics ECHO Club sessions, Prep pupils have enjoyed learning about Caecilius, a banker who lived in Pompeii in 79 AD, by translating short passages from Latin into English which describe what life was like at the time. This work allowed pupils to make links between English and Latin words. We also looked at historical aspects such as how homes

were built, what Romans ate, what entertainment Romans enjoyed, how they counted and finally, the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. Linked to these topics, the



pupils created some lovely craft projects, such as mini gladiators, mosaics of Mount Vesuvius and games of dominoes.


