### Y6 STEM Workshop at The Cedars

Last week, Year 6 were invited to The Cedars, over in Crystal Palace, for a morning of STEM workshops hosted by some of their teachers.

To start the morning, the children had a Chemistry lesson, and they were introduced to the periodic table. Listening to a song, the children noted down some of the elements that they recognised, along with their chemical symbols. For example: Gold = Au, Calcium = Ca, Iron = Fe. After this, the children worked in pairs to investigate different liquids, checking for the presence of any elements



by observing how they reacted to a flame. In doing so, the children noticed that some liquids contained different elements, for example, Copper Sulphate and Lithium Iodide, and these caused the flame to change colour. All of a sudden, the invention of fireworks and how we get such bright colours started to make sense!



### <u>Sport</u>

It's been an extremely busy week for our sports teams. On Monday, our Year 4s travelled to Merton Court for a tag rugby match and it was great to see all their hard work in lessons being transferred to the matches. We were particularly impressed with both their organisation in defence and their support play in attack and they should be extremely pleased with the progress they are making. ### Word of the Week

We missed including our "Word of the Week" in last week's newsletter, but do ask your child what the word was and see if they can remember

the definition! In Prep School, it was a particularly challenging one—so much so that Mr. Carter had to look it up himself before discussing it in assembly!

This week's words are:

Pre-Prep: *Meagre* (meaning small in quantity or lacking in fullness)

Prep: **Peruse** (meaning to read or examine carefully)

To help reinforce these words at home, here are a few fun ideas:

**Definition Guessing Game:** Ask your child to use the word in a sentence or describe what it means in their own words. Can they think of something in their day that was meagre? Or maybe they could peruse a book and tell you something new they noticed!

**Sentence Swap**: Take turns coming up with a sentence using each word. For example, "The Pre-Prep lunch was anything but meagre!" or "I plan to peruse the family recipe book this weekend."

We hope these words spark some great conversations at home and help build their vocabulary in a fun way!
