Alongside this, we've had a bumper week celebrating World Book Day! Under the skilful guidance of Mr Pretara, what is usually a one-day affair has turned into a whole festival of bookrelated fun. From exciting author workshops and visits, and activities led by our specialists who took over the library, to special morning sessions where parents could come in and enjoy the library with their children, there has been something for everyone. The highlight, of course, was Thursday's fantastic dress-up day, where pupils arrived

transformed into their favourite book characters - it was a wonderful sight! As you all know, I will never stop going on about the importance of reading, as it truly is the cornerstone of learning. Year 4 Workshop

On Friday, a Roman soldier stopped by for the day to rest his weary legs! Whilst he was here, he was able to tell us all about what daily life was like for the Romans. The day was filled with a variety of activities that brought the Roman era to life. The morning started with Joshua volunteering to dress up as a Roman soldier in full battle dress! 'Skippio' was able to wear the helmet, armour and hold a sword to show us all exactly how the armour was designed to be protective in battle. It was clear that it was far superior to that of the barbarians. Sorry, Boudicca!

We also had the unique opportunity to learn some Latin and write on wax tablets, play traditional Roman games, sample some Roman stew, provide a taste of the culinary delights enjoyed by soldiers during their travels and find out (and fire!) mini catapults. One messy activity involved smearing olive oil on ourselves to clean ourselves properly (apparently) and polish up some armour using olive also as well so it didn't rust. We even flexed our muscles grinding some wheat for the flour he needed to make his extremely hard bread. Our

Roman visitor was certainly delighted in getting us to do some jobs for him!

In addition to these activities, our pupils handled a range of artefacts, allowing them to connect more deeply with the history we are studying. We learnt how



to identify the era it may be from and what it might have been used for. The highlight of the day for many, was marching in the formation of a tortoise, a defensive manoeuvre used by soldiers in battle. The teamwork and camaraderie displayed by the children during this activity were commendable! Our two opposing armies took this very seriously and we were glad that none of the children will ever be a Roman soldier! Our children really enjoyed this immersive experience and we learnt so much that we will be able to refer to, as we continue learning about the Romans this term.



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Reception

This week in Science, Reception has been learning all about reversible change. We explored frozen chunks of ice and discussed the changes we noticed as our hands handled the ice, we spoke about the ice melting and turning into water. The children debated whether the size of the ice would have an impact on the speed of the melting process, we all agreed that a bigger chunk of ice would take far longer than a small ice cube. Our giant class ice cube was placed in the Spring sunshine and we observed the process of solid to liquid throughout the day, it started the day as hard block ice but before we went home all that was left was a pool of liquid water! The children watched a similar process with solid chocolate buttons and how when under heat they began to melt. They were very relieved to remember that this process could be reversed, all we needed to do was place our chocolate splats into a cool fridge to solidify them once more!

We felt that our Year 6 pupils truly deserved a well-earned treat from the school for all of their hard work and resilience throughout the 11+ process. 
ple opportunities for family meals, this event is dedicated to fostering our parent community.
