These sessions are always incredibly useful, and we are so fortunate to have David as part of our school community. Additionally, on Monday, The School Council representatives from Years 4 to 6 had the incredible opportunity to visit the Houses of Parliament with Mrs. West. This visit wasn't just about seeing the grand buildings (though that's always exciting!); it was a chance for our pupils to understand democracy in action and reflect on how they can make a difference through their own School Council. What better way to inspire the next generation of decision-makers? Meanwhile, Monday also saw great excitement as we hosted another home sporting fixture! Year 3 played a football match against Farrington's, in what was a brilliantly organised and competitive event. Later in the week, our Year 5 and Year 6 teams also took part in away matches, showcasing their skill and determination. I must say, the energy and enthusiasm in sport have really flourished under Mr. Murphy's leadership. His organisation and high standards have brought an extra level of rigour to our sporting provision, and we're excited to see how he develops his vision for the department over the coming years.

Midweek, we held our second House Meeting of the term, where pupils reflected on our Life Skills Initiative. Our House Leaders were thrilled to hear about all the activities pupils have been working on independently, and it's wonderful to see so many children embracing practical, hands-on skills beyond the academic curriculum. These real world practical skills are invaluable for building confident, capable young people. This initiative also ties in closely with the ideas David, our counsellor, shared in his talk on Monday about the importance of giving children opportunities and responsibilities. Research shows that when children take on meaningful tasks, whether at school or home, they develop stronger resilience, independence, and problem-solving skills. Studies, such as those by the Harvard Center on the Developing Child, highlight that allowing young people to navigate real world challenges in a supportive environment builds their ability to adapt and thrive. The latter half of the week was all about trips, trips, and more trips! Year 3 explored the natural beauty of Beckenham Place Park, connecting with nature and deepening their understanding of local habitats. Year 5 journeyed to the Royal Observatory, where they got to stand on the Prime Meridian and expand their knowledge of space, time, and the stars above. Year 1 had an adventure at Leeds Castle, bringing history to life as they wandered through its magnificent rooms and gardens. These trips are such a valuable way to bring learning to life, offering firsthand experiences that simply can't be replicated in the classroom.

Finally, we ended the week with a brilliant celebration of National Science Week. The whole school enjoyed an exciting workshop that showcased the creativity and wonder of science. This theme had already been introduced by Mr. Chowdhury and Mrs. Morris in our Wednesday assembly, and it was fantastic to see pupils engaging so enthusiastically with the world of scientific discovery.

Phew! What a rich and varied week it has been - one that truly highlights the breadth of our curriculum and the dedication we have to ensuring every child finds something that excites and inspires them.

Author Visit - Momoko Abe

Momoko Abe - Japanese author and illustrator - visited St Christopher's on Tuesday, starting with a read-along of one of her stories with the youngest pupils in our community - in Preschool.

Following this, Reception and Year 1 had their workshop around her story *Pearl and Her Bunch*'. After reading the story together, pupils enjoyed discussions around the plot and the characters, and did some live draw-alongs with Momoko. To end the session, pupils got crafty and created their own vegetable families, inspired by the characters in Momoko's stories, which would look wonderful stuck to the fridge at home!

Ilani (10) - I liked that the grapes in the story let Pearl, who is a pea, join their family, and it didn't matter that she looked a bit different.

Next, Momoko delivered another workshop, but this time to Year 2 and Year 3. Throughout the session, pupils learnt more about Momoko's life and how it led her to become an author, before reading the story 'Avocado Asks: What Am I?' together. Dovetailing with our English curriculum, Momoko shared her process for developing characters and the plot within the story, ahead of pupils sketching characters of their own - inspired by the story.
