Dear Parents.

This week has been a particularly special one in school, as we marked the start of Anti-Bullying Week, a nationwide initiative designed to remind us all that kindness, respect, and inclusion are everyone's responsibility. The

theme this year focuses on the power of positive action, showing that even small gestures can make a big difference in creating a community where every child feels valued and safe.

We kicked things off in typically cheerful St Christopher's style with Odd Socks Day! The sight of brightly mismatched socks everywhere was a wonderful reminder that our differences make us unique, and that celebrating individuality is what makes our community so vibrant. It was fantastic

to see pupils (and staff!) getting involved and wearing their oddest pairs with pride.

I'd also like to take a moment to thank the many parents who have shared such positive feedback about the upcoming changes to our daily structure. I know, too, that for some families these adjustments may feel more challenging, particularly where routines, timings, or arrangements will need to shift. Change often brings both gains and perceived losses, and

it's entirely understandable that some may feel the impact more keenly than others. Please know that every element has been carefully considered, with the best interests of our pupils, and the long-term wellbeing of our school community, at heart. It's important to emphasise that the purpose of the clubs we provide is enrichment, not childcare. These sessions are designed to inspire, extend learning, and give pupils new opportunities beyond the classroom. For families seeking wraparound care at the end of the school day, Munchkins remain available, offering the same warm, familiar provision at a very similar cost to what parents currently pay, so there is no loss of support. Of course, for those who would like their child to enjoy an enrichment activity and then move on to after-school care, this remains entirely possible. These are two different types of provision, and

while there may be a small additional cost, we are working hard to ensure that any increase is kept both manageable and reasonable. Even where these changes may affect you personally, I hope you can recognise that the intention behind them is deeply positive: to create greater consistency across the school, to support staff in delivering their very best, and to give pupils a smoother, more balanced rhythm to their days. In time, I am confident that this evolution will strengthen the experience for everyone involved.

We rounded off the week with our assembly on Children in Need, exploring the importance of empathy, generosity, and community spirit. It's always a valuable moment for pupils to reflect on how different life can be for others, and how kindness, in both big and small ways, can truly change lives. The highlight of the morning, of course, was seeing one of our very own staff members donning the Pudsey Bear costume,

much to the delight (and mild astonishment!) of everyone watching.

Next week marks the arrival of our school Christmas tree, always a magical moment! Continuing our much-loved tradition, every pupil will hang their own named decoration on the tree each year until they leave us in Year 6.

Decorations have been handed to class teachers ready for the big moment. For new pupils (or anyone missing one), your class teacher will let you know, and ask you to please send in a simple

festive ornament labelled with your child's **first** and last name, no class names needed. If you're stuck, we have a few spares in the office for children to choose from. It's a heartwarming tradition that brings our community together, one decoration, one child, one wonderful Christmas tree!

Thank you, as always, for your continued support, positivity, and partnership. Together, we're helping our pupils grow into thoughtful, confident young people who know the power of kindness and compassion, and who also know how to rock a very good pair of odd socks!

Year 1

We have been so busy in Year 1 since Half Term! In English, we've been getting our teeth into our new text, Winter Sleep, which has sparked our curiosity about animals and how they survive the colder months. The children have been fascinated



to learn all about hibernation, exploring how different creatures find safe, cosy places to rest through the winter. Our classroom discussions and writing activities have really brought this topic to life!

In Humanities, we've turned our attention closer

to home, learning all about our local area. We've started to explore the history and landmarks of Beckenham, and the children have loved comparing what Beckenham is like now with what it

might have been like in the past. We can't wait to continue discovering more about the place we live and go to school!

As scientists, we've been investigating Everyday Materials - looking closely at the things around us and thinking about what they are made from and why. One of the biggest surprises was discovering that glass actually comes from sand! The children were amazed and have been eager to test and sort materials to see which are strong, flexible, or waterproof.

Perhaps the most exciting thing happening in Year 1 right now is our preparation for the Nativity play! The children are working hard to learn their lines and sing a wonderful collection of songs - including a few in different languages. We don't want to give too much away, but we can promise a joyful, heart-warming performance that will get everyone in the festive spirit. Year 4

The knee bone is connected to the leg bone!

This term in Science, Class 4C has started an exciting new topic "Animals, including Humans." The children began by sharing everything they already know about the human body - and it turns out, they know quite a lot!

We talked about how the human body is made up of many important organs, each with its own special job. The children were quick to name the



heart, which pumps blood around the body, and the lungs, which help us breathe. They also discussed the brain, our body's control centre, and the stomach, which helps to digest our food.

Using body outlines and diagrams, the class had fun guessing where each organ is found and how

big it might be. The children's interest peaked when they discovered that the skin is the largest of the human organs and that the heart is approximately the size of a fist and slightly to the left of the chest bone (sternum).

Over the next few weeks, 4C will be learning more about how the body works together as a system - and how humans share similarities and differences with other animals. It's going to be a fascinating journey inside the human body!
