Dear Parents,

Before anything else, a small but mildly alarming milestone... This is the 150th newsletter I have written since becoming Head. Which means I have now produced enough words to fill several short novels or at least one moderately sized encyclopedia.

It also means you have very patiently read (or politely skimmed) updates involving lost jumpers, weather observations, theatrical productions, character education, and the occasional over-excited use of exclamation marks. For this, I thank you deeply.

Now onto this week... if, like me, the dark mornings are starting to feel a little bit personal, you are very much not alone. However, I heard something genuinely cheering on the radio this week. rent club pathway. There will be three more for them to collect over the coming terms, so this is very much the start of their Compass journey.

On Tuesday, we held our House Assembly with a focus on Team Challenges. These assemblies are an important part of school life. They give pupils a chance to mix with children from other year groups, and practise the kinds of skills that don't always fit neatly into a lesson, listening properly, sharing ideas, solving problems together and supporting one another when things go a bit wrong. In short, they help turn very capable pupils into very great humans too. On Wednesday, we also marked Martin Luther King Jr. Day; reflecting on his message and the importance of fairness, respect and standing up for what is right, values that sit very naturally at the heart of our school.

It does, however, feel fitting that in a week with relatively little everyday news to report, I am using this space to share something rather significant. Mrs Jeffery, my PA and our School Registrar, will be retiring at the end of this academic year. She has been with the school for 16 years and is not only my confidant, my organisational safety net and my daily source of laughter, but also my friend. Writing this makes me feel a little bit like someone has quietly moved the furniture when I wasn't looking. I know many of you will feel genuinely sad about this news too. Mrs Jeffery is very much part of the heartbeat of our school, and countless families have benefitted from her calm manner, friendly presence and wonderfully welcoming personality. I suspect more than a few of you could share a story about a moment when she made something stressful feel manageable, or simply made your day a bit easier. The PA role is an incredibly personal one for any Head, so I will really feel her absence. That said, with a grandchild on the way and a growing list of hobbies (including recently taking up pottery), she has a very exciting new chapter ahead, even if it doesn't involve filling my diary or gently reminding me what day it is. There will be plenty of time later in the year to celebrate her properly, and we will absolutely be doing so.

Year 4 - The Romans are coming!

At St Christopher's, we believe that the best learning happens when children can see, touch and experience the past for themselves. The children certainly did this on our Roman Day, last Thursday, which was a total success!

Year 4 were transported nearly 2,000 years back in time and discovered what it was really like to live and work as a Roman soldier. The day was



delivered by Centurion Julius Marcellinus, an acting centurion of the II Legion Augusta, the legion that served with Emperor Claudius' invasion force of Britain in AD 43. Throughout the day, the children took part in a wide range of engaging activities, including: battle formations, creating

Year 2

Year 2 have been busy developing their computing skills by designing their own maps and writing simple programs (algorithms) to control a robot. Working in teams, they divided their map into squares so each member knew exactly what to draw in their section. They then programmed the robot to travel to specific points on the map and tested how accurate their instructions were. This fun, hands-on activity helped them practise teamwork, clear instructions, and problem-solving as they debugged and improved their programs.

The equipment, costumes and characters they encountered were as historically accurate as possible, helping pupils to develop a deeper and more memorable understanding of the Roman world, and all the children left with a deeper understanding of life as a Roman and furthered historical detective skills.
